


## Team Work Helps Brett Find Shelter from the Cold

I found Brett one cold morning, huddled on our bench outside the Center for Life, wearing hospital scrubs and a bracelet from Advent Hospital. He was sitting, read his bible and trying to find some peace. I introduced myself and asked if I could help him. He'd heard about Interfaith and the Center For Life from the Care 360 Team at Advent Hospital where he'd just been released. I got him something to drink and some food, then we sat down and chatted.

Brett was from South Carolina and had driven to Florida, as many homeless do, in search of opportunities. He had been admitted to Advent Hospital due to a dehydration episode and had lost his car to impound during that time. He had no job, no prospects and nowhere to stay, homeless. I sent him to see Shannon at the Thrift Store for some clothing and then explained he could get some lunch at the Soup Kitchen. I told him to come back to see me so I could try to find a solution for him.

Ned, our Engagement Center Manager, came over to interview Brett and found no options. The Salvation Army shelter was closed for renovations and all other facilities in town for men required them to have a drug problem, which Brett did not. Sometimes there is not an easy solution and we can only fix the immediate needs, as heart breaking as it is.

I went home that evening with no answers and plenty of prayers on my

He thanked us many times over as he loaded up with his bible and new supplies, heading for the shelter in Gainesville. ## From the Chief Executive Officer: Karla Grimsley-Greenway



First I have to share my gratitude for the outpouring of support we received over the recent holidays. All of you who gave, truly make this ministry possible. I know that God blesses you for it, because that is just how HE is. But what a blessing YOU are to the people we serve!

This brings me to a different "giving" subject. While many give money (and Lord knows we need it!), we also need your stuff. I often get calls from people who will say "I have this lovely couch but I want you to give it to someone in need". Of course we will honor that because we are required to always honor the wishes of the donor. But it may just so happen that we may not have a person at that exact moment that needs a couch and we really struggle with storage space. So it's important for you to know what we do with a couch (or other household items or clothes) when we can't quickly move it into the home

of someone in need. We sell it and use the money to buy life-saving medications for someone who doesn't have insurance! Isn't that cool?! This is how we have funded our Prescription Medication Assistance Program for over 2 decades! And now the store also helps us fund other services that we can offer to clients. We also give away merchandise from our Thrift Store to shelter residents moving into their new apartments or other people in desperate need. Most years, our Thrift Store vouchers (gives away) over \$11,000 worth of merchandise in this way. But the items we sell allow us to purchase \$40,000 worth of medication and pay for counseling and other services that help people experiencing homelessness. So you are really doing a good thing when you donate your items (in good condition) to our store.

I would be remiss not to mention the partnership we have with the Marion County Hospital District. This wonderful entity manages the funds previously raised by the Munroe Hospital Foundation. A group of trustees distribute the funds to support projects in our community that improve the health and well-being of Marion County citizens. For Interfaith they specifically fund mental health medications and diabetic medications! This partnership has allowed us to save and improve the lives of thousands of individuals over the past several years and we are grateful!

Austre said it was difficult to ask for anything because she has never been a situation as she was now. She was from Utah and found herself here without a job or place to live. Her funds were quickly running out that she had saved. She
