From the Chief Executive Officer: Karla Grimsley-Greenway




Does anyone else feel like 2025 has shot them out of a cannon?! This new year is already moving quickly. There are so many exciting things happening this year! I want to share a few with you.

We just started the first ever "Interfaith Homeless Advisory Council." This is a group of individuals who are either experiencing homelessness or have resolved their homelessness. They are charged with helping us do the best job possible of engaging, in order to help people change their situations. Stay tuned for more info to come on that!

Partner Agencies are growing! Saving Mercy just broke ground on a building project to provide additional housing opportunities for those of low income. Wear Gloves is beginning renovations to

create more emergency shelter with a focus on employability. A new shelter is being developed for victims of domestic violence by CASA Marion. And later this year Interfaith will be expanding our shelter to add additional beds for women and children. All of these programs work not to promote dependency but to help people gain self sufficiency. We live in such a wonderful community, and we all appreciate the support necessary to run these programs.

In the beginning of December, I was contacted by a sweet lady named Susie Clauson. She said that she would like to drop off some quilts for the women and children in our shelter. A few days later she showed up at the shelter with so many bags - they were filled with nearly 100 homemade quilts!

Susie spent some time with me explaining she is with a group at On Top of the World. The group is a non-profit called Serving Bee's Club Inc, which has served Marion County for over 2 years. Susie, Vice-President, is pictured right. This group spends all year making beautiful homemade quilts for the disadvantaged children of Marion County. The quilts were one of a kind. Such vibrant colors and no design was the same. The Christmas themed quilts even had homemade gifts wrapped inside. Each of our shelter children and the mothers got to enjoy this one of kind gift. We were also able to give to our past resident families.

Thank you from the bottom of my heart to Interfaith and the Center For Life. My son went to the hospital with heart problems. They were able to stabilize him and discharge him with no surgery, but they put him on a lot of medicines. These medicines are very, very expensive. He will need to be on them maybe for life and he is only 33 years old.

The staff at the Center for Life helped us pay for his medications and sent my son to Heart of Florida for follow up, where we like the doctors. They also helped us to apply to their Patient Assistance Program - where we can get coverage for my son's 2 most expensive medications. Because of that, he can get these medicines from the manufacturer at no charge. Praise God!

I don't know what we would have done without their help. What are a Godsend. The Center for Life helped to save my son's life!
