

Forever Homes Provide Joy to Formerly Homeless, by Sonya Tyler, Director of Operations

With the purchase of the 14th Street Apartments, we had a lot on our plates to get them ready for tenants, as well as qualifying the existing tenants that already lived there. The exciting thing about the apartments is that they are a three-fold blessing. First, as affordable housing is quickly disappearing, we can provide 8 units that tenants can income-qualify for, allowing them a safe, affordable place to live. 5 more units are for our Permanent Supportive Housing, for our homeless friends that are receiving help from our staff to transition into a brand new home and a brand new life (a total of 11 people). The final unit has been set aside for a local law enforcement officer for free housing, in exchange for helping provide safety and oversight for the other 13 units. (If you know of an officer that would like to take advantage of free housing, please contact Karla or Sonya.)

For the 5 supportive housing units, Karla's vision was to reach out to our local church partners and have them adopt not only an apartment (from top to bottom), but also the individuals moving in. This meant furnishing an entire apartment - painting, furniture, kitchen supplies, pots & pans, sheets, towels - everything they would need for their new home. Not only did they totally make the apartments a beautiful place to live, they went above and beyond by filling their refrigerators and kitchen cabinets

with food, providing baskets of hygiene supplies - even

coolest things I've ever seen.

The beautiful thing to watch was the 'church' stepping outside their walls, and becoming friends with the men and women that would live in those units. Learning their preferences so that they picked the colors of their





A Home for Gary, Squiggy and Pancho

When a homeless person seeks the services of our Rapid Rehousing Team, there is no such thing as "average" since each case will present a unique set of needs and circumstances. A classic case in point is Gary.

Gary arrived at my office in December...he had been living in his vehicle since September with a big beautiful tabby cat named Squiggy, and Pancho the Bearded Dragon. Gary's main concern really wasn't for himself, but he was mostly worried his pets were suffering with the cold at night and the hot days in his car while he worked at his job. When a client becomes homeless, they have already lost so much...their housing and most of their possessions are now history... so if we can accommodate their pets into their new apartment, it is such a meaningful moment. In Gary's case, it did make the placement a little more expensive paying pet fees, but the reward was a happier client who brings their beloved pet to a home they can share together. This is such an important step in rebuilding their lives together, and increases the long term success rate of the housing placement. And heaven knows we don't need any more abandoned animals at the overburdened Marion County Animal Shelter!

So Gary, Squiggy and Pancho were presented as a package deal to our Housing Navigator, Brittian and we prayerfully went forward searching for the perfect apartment for the little family.

It did take a while to find a pet friendly unit, but God is so faithful and presented us with an affordable apartment that even has a balcony overlooking a nice wooded area for

was moved in using the ESG Rapid Rehousing Grant for startup costs and moving expenses. A wonderful church helped provide very affordable furniture, and Gary's little family now has a home. In Gary's case, He provided not only provided for Gary, but added the bonus of Squiggy and Pancho too!

We continue to struggle with the pandemic and the food shortages due to supplies being stuck on containers on the high seas and at shipping ports. However, the Food 4 Kids program is blessed to work with some awesome food suppliers that save the day, and our budget!

I would like to say thank you to Rodney Phillips, Store Manager and Debbie Rioseco, Assistant Store Manager (pictured right) at Save-a-Lot on Silver Spring Blvd in Ocala. Since working with them, they have stepped in to make sure that our food order is complete. If we order a particular item that is not available, they call me to let me know that we won't be getting it, or they will ask if I want to substitute it for another item of the same value and within the same perimeter of what is on our list that we provide the students. With the communication that we receive from Rodney and Debbie, we are more prepared to go elsewhere to look for any items that they can't provide so that we can continue to provide all six meals to our students over the weekend. Sometimes it is difficult to find people so willing to help their customers, but they definately go above and beyond - especially when I must show up before opening time to pickup my food order. Accommodating my early arrival is crucial, so that I can get the food back to our warehouse so the food will be ready to get packed into the bags for students. It takes a village - and we're grateful to Rodney and Debbie for making it easier!
